As you may have seen in the summer issue of the Dilworth Quarterly, the school was chosen last spring to be the Dilworth community's next non-profit partner.

Did you know that we are the only neighborhood association in Charlotte that offers volunteers and support to a non-profit partner on a regular basis?

A little history: in May of 2017, the CMS school board voted to pair Dilworth Elementary with Sedgefield Elementary, creating the New Dilworth Elementary School (DES). The Sedgefield campus serves students Pre-K through second grade, and the Latta campus serves third through fifth graders. The total

school population is around 700 students. The new DES provides an exciting opportunity to give increased resources to more children and ensure greater chances for their success.

The halls at both campuses are filled with wonderful staff, supportive families, and excited children embarking on a new school year. Under the leadership of principal Terry Hall, there are plans to upgrade each campus in numerous ways, including courtyard renovations, an outside learning center at the Sedgefield Campus and a science lab and Innovation Center at the Latta Campus, just to name a few. Schools are the heart of our community, and Dilworth Cares is excited to work with the families of Dilworth, Myers Park, Sedgefield, Freedom Park, Colonial Village and others to give our children the best education in Charlotte.

There are many ways to become involved with our new partner schools. Both campuses are currently recruiting volunteers to help clean up and improve the outdoor courtyards, and the Latta campus is looking for weekly volunteers to mentor and tutor a student as a "Learning Buddy." 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

Update on the Kenilworth Substation Expansion

When the Kenilworth substation was built in 1963 and energized in 1964, the population of Charlotte was 201,564 and Reddy Kilowatt was Duke Power's mascot. Fast forward to 2018, the city has grown to an estimated 884,509 residents, which has changed the demand for electricity in ways the now-retired Reddy Kilowatt could never imagine.

As you may have noticed, Duke Energy is in the process of

expanding the electrical transmission substation located at 2217 Kenilworth Ave. The Dilworth Community Association Land Use Committee has been working on this matter since neighbors first received notice of the expansion in November 2015. Due to the city's weak ordinance requirements for public utilities, only rudimentary aesthetic treatments were required in the plan for the Kenilworth substation expansion. This plan was approved by the City of Charlotte in January 2016. Given the substation's prominent location between Scott and Kenilworth Avenues, the DCA Land Use Committee has been meeting with various Duke Energy employees over the last three years in an attempt to make the substation fit into the neighborhood. We have proposed several different scenarios, attempting to develop an acceptable solution to mitigate the impact of this expansion within the neighborhood.

The DCA Land Use Committee continued to insist that aesthetic improvements were required until Duke Energy offered a new solution. In April 2018, Duke Energy appropriated funds specifically for aesthetic treatments to help screen the expansion of the unsightly components of a 1963 substation situated in the middle of a historic neighborhood. A subcommittee of Land Use has been working with a Duke Energy task force, and we are very fortunate to have on our team the expertise of Dilworth neighbor Michael Dunning, a principal with Shook Kelley design firm. Our goal has been to improve the aesthetic design and appearance of the original substation expansion plan, while maintaining the stringent safety requirements.

Although we are making progress, much work remains to be done. The originally approved plan called for a gray, vinyl, eight-foot wall around the substation, which we deemed only slightly more appealing than the chain link fence topped with barbed wire currently surrounding the substation. Though limited to using a Duke Energy-approved vendor's product, we were able to change the screening wall to beige, pre-cast concrete panels




This sample screen wall illustrates how the Kenilworth Ave. side may look.

in a cobblestone pattern with bullnose coping (i.e., rounded edges) and large columns. We also were able to secure approval for an artistic metal panel from 8- to 12-feet high, which will run along Kenilworth Avenue. The panel will be created by SEAS, a fabricator and manufacturer of ornamental metals here in Charlotte.

After several meetings with CDOT, we are hopeful we can mitigate the dangerous conditions for pedestrians around the substation. We are on track to implement a "road diet" along the Kenilworth block, which will take advantage of the unused eight-foot on-street parking strip there. Bumping out the curb will allow for a six-foot sidewalk and planting strip, which is a standard requirement for new development. At a minimum, we also want to provide curb and gutter along Ordermore Avenue and possibly a five-foot sidewalk as well. If all falls into place, there could be properly functional sidewalks all the way around that block, without obstructions such as fire hydrants and transmission towers blocking the path.

The last piece of our challenge is landscaping design, which we will begin working on soon. Sadly, many existing trees were destroyed as part of the expansion. However, we will enhance the city-approved landscape plan to maximize screening of the substation infrastructure with as many large trees as possible. Fortunately, one of our new team members, Allison Merriman, landscape design architect with LandDesign, will add her

expertise to help us in this endeavor.

Key dates for the project are site-development activities Sept. – Dec. 2018, substation construction & landscaping activities Jan. – Dec. 2019 and a target project completion date of Dec. 2019. We will share visuals and updates on a web site at <http://kenilworthexpansion.weebly.com> to keep the neighborhood informed of the plans and progress. Meanwhile, we remain hopeful about achieving the best results for our neighborhood. ■

The Butterfly Highway

Declines in monarch and honeybee populations have made national news headlines and brought a lot of attention to the troubles facing our insect pollinators. The iconic monarch butterfly has faced a significant population decline, and in the winter of 2014-2015 reached an all-time low in their overwintering locations in Mexico. Monarch butterflies were once commonly seen in the spring and fall migration through North Carolina, but now sightings have become rarer due to the declining population and available habitat. This decline has been attributed to numerous factors including: forest loss in overwintering areas, loss of breeding habitat due to agricultural practices, urbanization, increase pesticide use, and the effects of climate change. Adult monarchs rely on a variety of nectar plants to provide energy for their long migration to Mexico as well as milkweed to lay their eggs on, as milkweed is the only plant that monarch caterpillars will eat. Without appropriate flower and plant resources, monarchs will not be able to survive. Species of wild bees and bumblebees have also declined over the last 50 years due to many of the same issues that are impacting monarchs and other pollinators. Managed honeybee populations have been experiencing similar issues in both the US and Europe that have been attributed to disease, loss of habitat, pesticide use and colony collapse disorder.

Pollinators such as bumblebees, butterflies, and other insects are critical to North Carolina's biological diversity and agricultural economy. Our native pollinators face numerous threats including loss of native plant habitat that provides vital nectar and pollen resources. The North Carolina Wildlife Federation is working to help protect these habitats through our statewide program, the Butterfly Highway. The goal of the Butterfly Highway is to bring together a coalition of public and private land owners committed to protecting and conserving habitat for pollinators and wildlife across North Carolina. These partnerships are critical to achieving our long-term



conservation goals. From rural lands in Eastern North Carolina to urban cityscapes in the Piedmont, the Butterfly Highway is working to protect habitat and build advocacy and awareness for pollinators. There is no quick fix to restore the lands that have been lost, but with adequate resources we will be able to protect and conserve our North Carolina lands for future generations.

We are excited to have the Dilworth Neighborhood and Latta Park as a pollinator pitstop on the Butterfly Highway and encourage you to join with your neighbors and pledge to provide food, shelter, and habitat for pollinators in your own backyard! You will be joining a network of 2,000 pollinator pitstops across the state protecting over 30,000 acres of land for pollinators. A Man of Many Talents

I first encountered Emery Spears when he delivered a package to my door, shortly after I had moved into Dilworth. In time, I came to know him as an outgoing, friendly person with an infectious laugh who delivered for UPS. Then he retired and I saw him no more. Until he turned up at Dilworth Drug and Wellness Center, where he now works.

As a child, Emery was very shy. He told me he always hid behind his mother's skirt when someone he didn't know was around. But his mother always took him to church, and that is where, he says, he eventually overcame his shyness. He ushered at church when he was 6 years old, and he is still an active member in his church

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today, where he is President of the Ushers Board and sings in the choir.

Emery worked on his uncle's 20 acre farm at an early age, starting at 5 a.m. each day. He helped pick the crops, make sausage, liver mush and molasses, and butchered goats and hogs. His first "job" was selling the farm's produce from the back of a 1966 Chevy pickup truck that he drove into town. He still has the truck in his backyard.

Emery has always loved cars and, especially, drag racing. He is a certified auto mechanic, specializing in Corvettes. The first car he owned was a 1973 Plymouth Roadrunner, which he purchased from the factory for \$3200. He is currently restoring and refurbishing it with customized parts. He plans to show it at car shows.

Inevitably, our conversation turned to Charlotte, where Emery was born. He attended West Charlotte and Independence high schools, and remembers not liking to wait for the school bus in rainy, cold weather. In those days high school students could drive the school buses, so Emery got the idea that if he drove a bus he wouldn't have to stand out there waiting for it. And, because they didn't have bus lots in those days, drivers were allowed to take their bus home. Emery was a sharp student!

We got to reminiscing about the old days. Emery worked at the

original Lance factory, located at 1300 South Boulevard, where South End is today. At that time there was a member of his family working on each of the three shifts at the company. I mentioned the Epicurean restaurant and he remembered the Eastland Mall site when it was a farm, and when there was a Ramada Inn where Harris Teeter is now in Dilworth Commons.

I wanted to know more about his experience at UPS. Emery told me he worked for the company for 41 years, retiring in 2015. When he first started with the company he didn't intend to stay with the job. That all changed, he says, when he discovered how nice the people were in Dilworth. He decided to stay with UPS and the Dilworth route. He found that Dilworth residents even trusted him with keys to their place so he could deliver packages when they weren't home. For older people, who wouldn't open their door to strangers, he used a special way of knocking on the door so they would know it was him. He still does that now for his pharmacy deliveries. Emery's philosophy is simply to treat others as he would like to be treated. It certainly works.

Emery is very proud of his safety record, having had no injuries or accidents on his record. The UPS company formally recognized him as a Corporate Icon, an exemplar of what a UPS employee should be.

Emery's wife of 21 years, Diane, is from Buford, South Carolina. They have three grown sons, and two dogs. When I asked Emery why he decided to return to work after retiring from UPS he said Diane always gave him a honey-do list! ■

One of their special events is a sausage fest on East Blvd. every November, but you will have to wait until next year to get your ticket for that fun happening.

Back to the food, they make their own sausage and have five signature sausages which include: JJ's Bratwurst, Andouille Sausage, Kasekreiner and a Seasonal Sausage. As for the hot dogs, Jon said "I traveled the country for one and a half years tasting regionally made hot dogs and kept coming back to Sahlen's hot dogs produced in my home town of Buffalo". Continuing to give me a lesson in hot dogs, Jon says "Sahlen's has made hot dogs for one hundred and fifty years and remains owned and operated by the same family, and they produce top quality dogs with natural casing and a great taste". By the way, you can also get turkey and



veggie dogs at JJ's.

One of the features of JJ's in nice weather is their terrific roof deck with a great view of Charlotte.

Jon says "one of my favorite parts of the business is seeing a grandfather and his grandkids come in together and equally enjoy their hot dogs". Friendly and good service is very important at JJ's and in addition to the great dogs, it is one of the reasons people keep coming back. Jon wants you to remember that you can get hot dog styles from every part of the country. He says, "so no matter where you are from and loved your dogs from there, you are likely to find that style at JJ's, too". Jon says they love Dilworth and like the neighborly atmosphere, and this will always be their flagship location. ■

Greetings Dilworth!
 My name is Jim Gilliland and I am the Community Coordinator (neighborhood officer) for the Dilworth and Freedom Park areas. I have served in this role since 2007. I attend your community meetings and try to keep you updated on crime trends. Throughout the past several years Larceny from Autos (car break-ins) continues to be our biggest challenge.

Quite often, a car break-in turns into a crime spree when keys are found inside the vehicle and they use the car to commit additional crimes. This summer almost all of the overnight home break-ins were precipitated by a vehicle being taken from nearby. **Close to 75% of all vehicle break-ins are to unlocked vehicles.** The thieves will continue to prey on Dilworth as long as we provide such easy targets. You must assume that your car doors will be checked every night. Remove your valuables, including FIREARMS. Leaving a firearm in your car is dangerous for everyone. This summer, we arrested two suspects and recovered a

firearm that had just been taken from an unsecured vehicle. Almost all vehicle thefts result from found keys. Please take a moment to make sure that there are no spare keys or “Valet Keys” in the glovebox.

While we do see some repeat offenders, the majority are new suspects. Quite simply, it is an attractive crime because it’s so rewarding. We need your help. Please lock your cars and remove valuables. “Lock-it or Lose-It.”

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
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Wrap-Up

Radio personality Romona Holloway encouraged the crowd to join in on the festive pet parade sponsored by **Dilworth Animal Hospital**.


The adults then listened to the sound of the band Bounce, a

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


